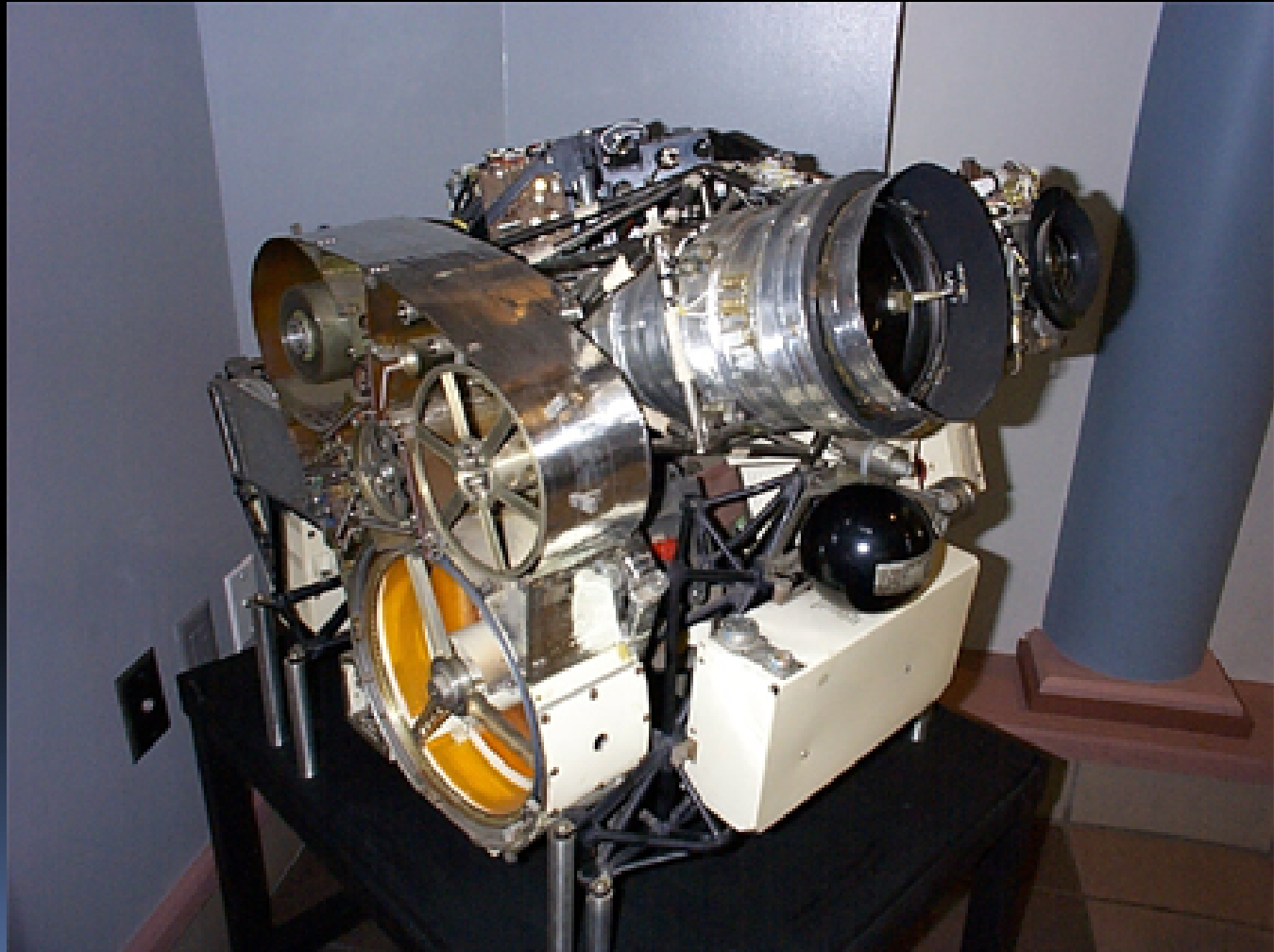
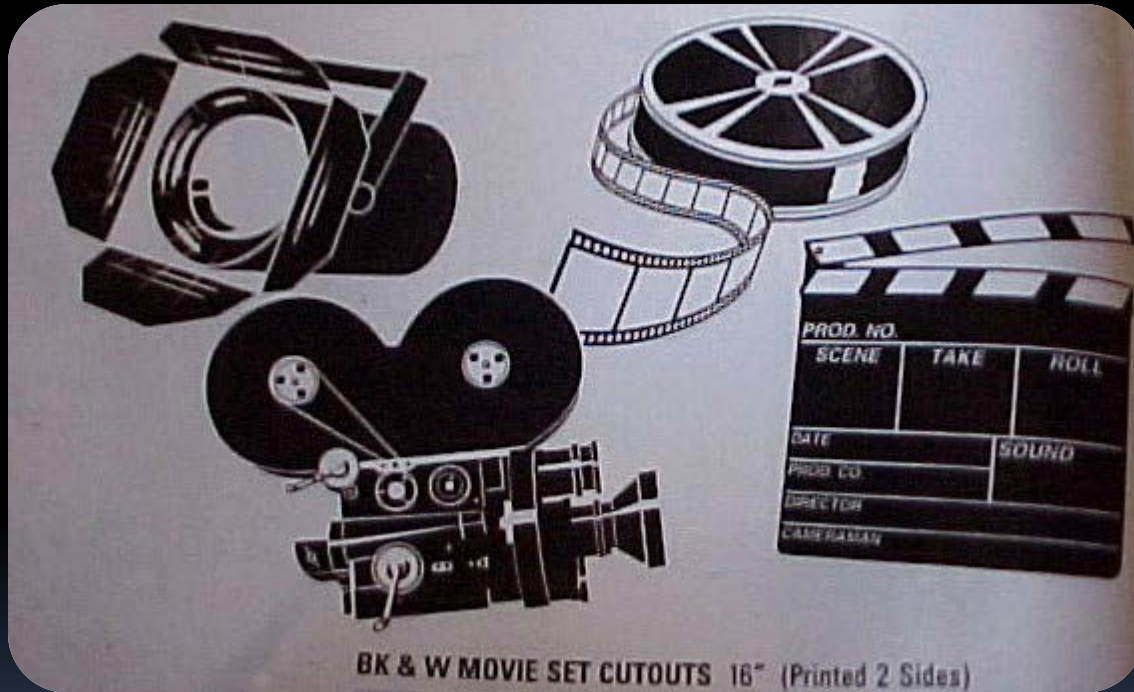

- Before synchronized sound, everything had to be communicated visually.
- Actors also had to be able to communicate with their bodies.

Title Cards were inserted to communicate dialogue to the audience.



# The Leap Forward: Synchronized Sound



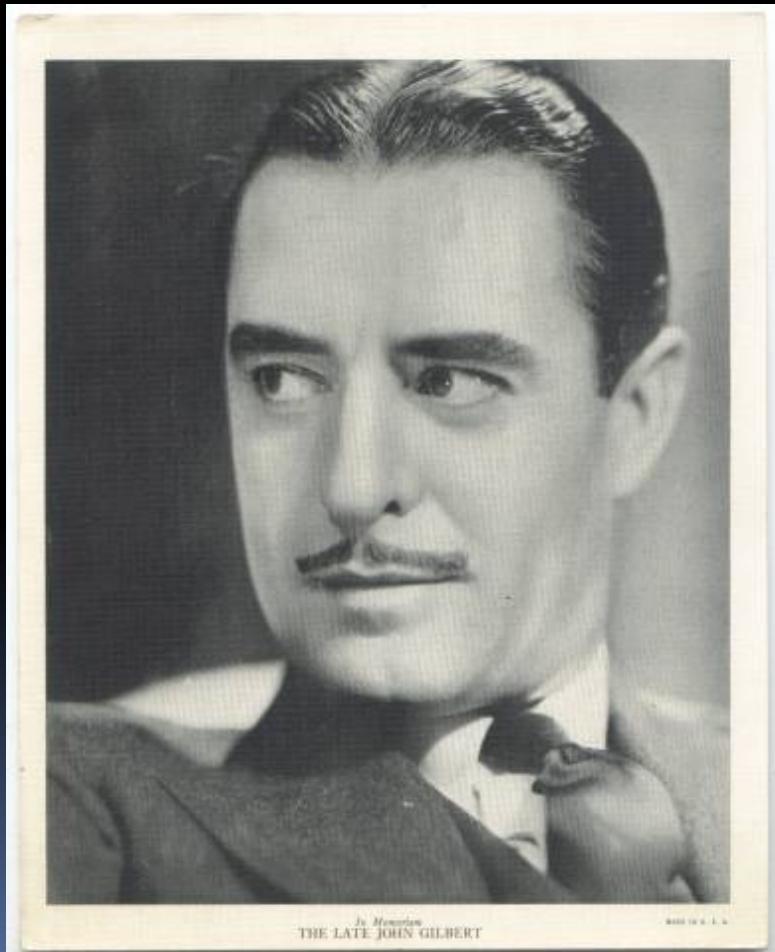
- “You ain’t heard nothin’ yet!”

Character Make Up: More elaborate than simple glamour.

Kong and his cohorts were articulated figures.



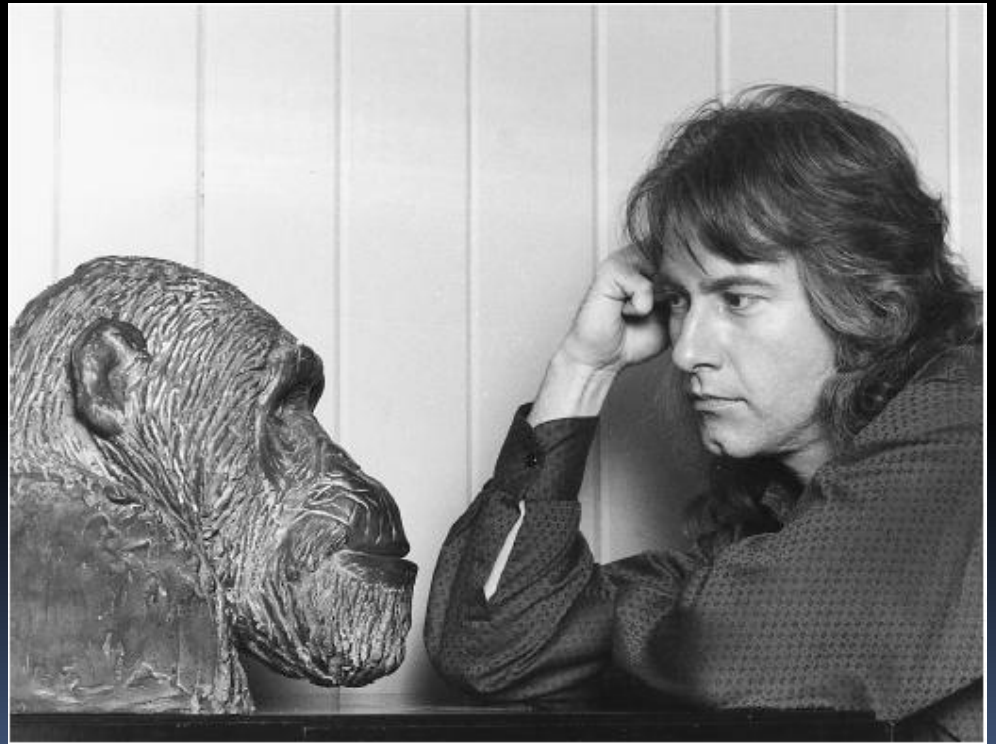
# Guys In Suits

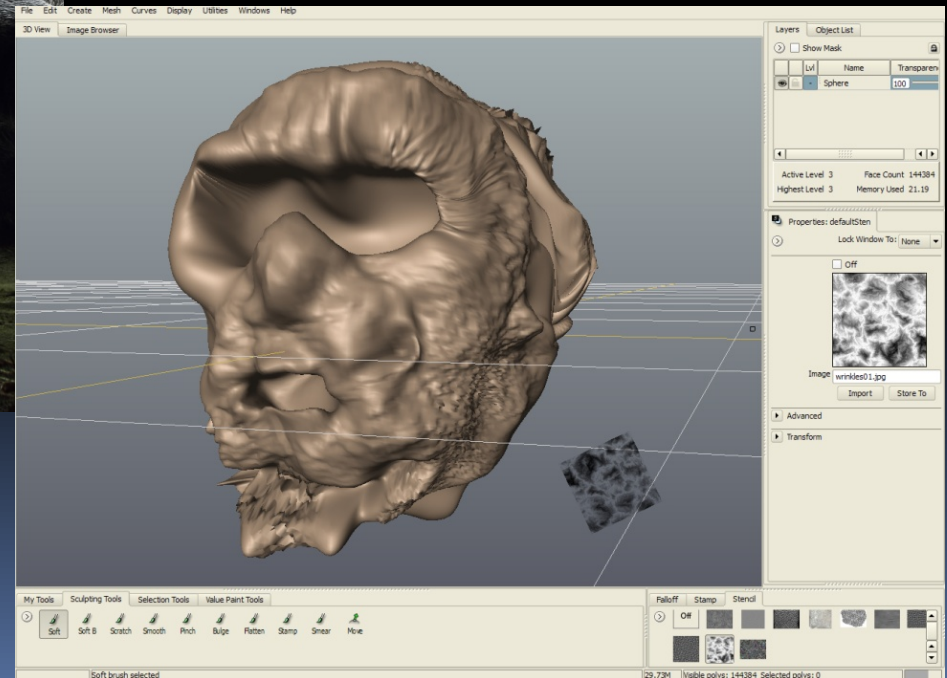

Actor processed with digital background

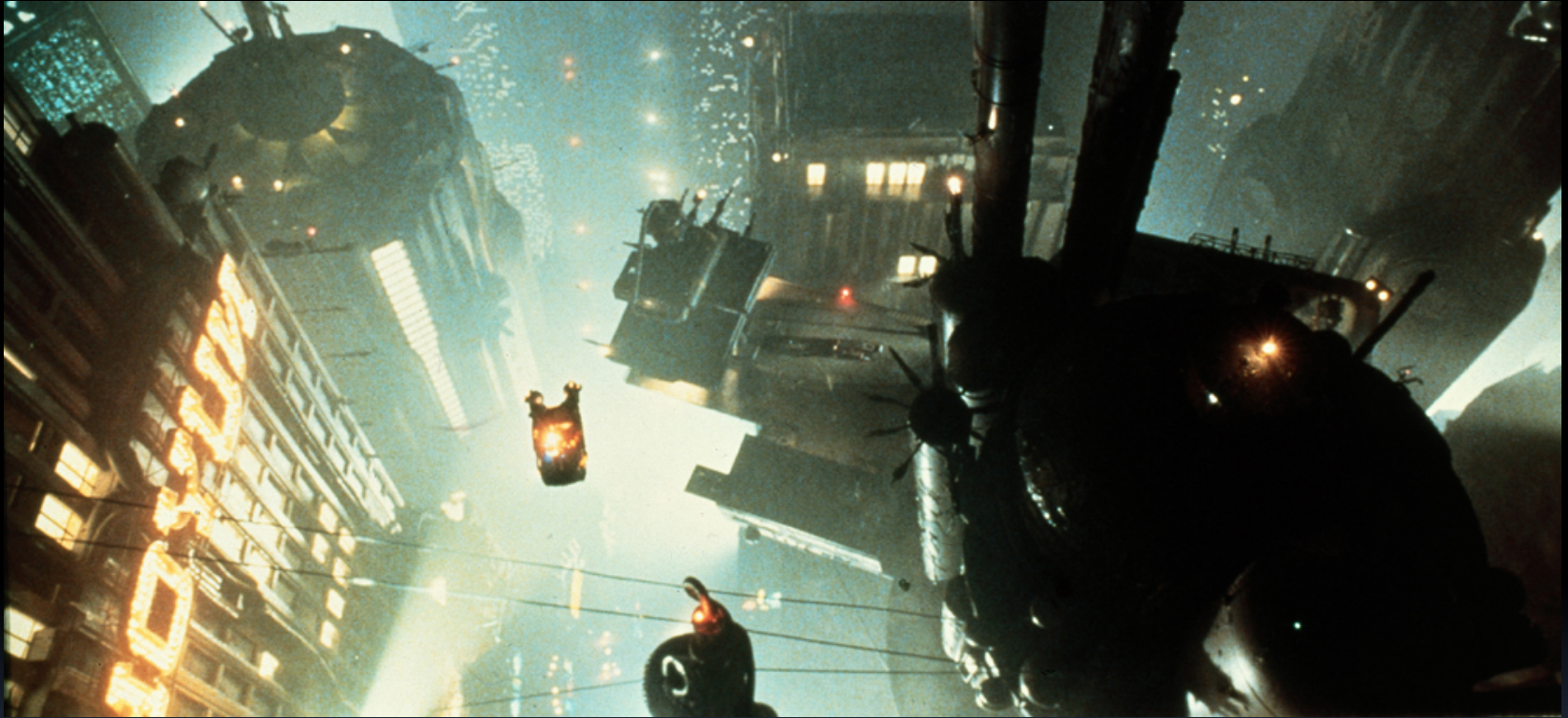
