




Critic Ronald L. James writes, "Anyone who picks up this novel, especially teachers who present this powerful piece of fiction to young readers, need to be aware that Trumbo was a Communist. The ulterior motive for writing Johnny Got His Gun was to support the insidious and despicable non-aggression pact between Nazi Germany and Stalin's USSR...The novel is not only propagandistic and manipulative, it is also simplistic in its attitude towards war." Is the novel propaganda?



Further Discussion

Author George Orwell said in 1941, "The choice before human beings is not between good and evil, but between two evils. You can let the Nazis rule the world; that is evil. Or you can overthrow them by war, which is also evil." Compare this to the message of Johnny Got His Gun. Is war ever justified?
