## Warm-Up: Executive Order 9981

In February 1948, Truman moved ahead on civil rights by using his executive powers. On July 26, 1948, he issued an executive order abolishing *segregation*, legal separations based on raced, in the armed forces and ordering full *integration*, inclusion of both races, of all the armed services. Executive Order 9981 stated that "there shall be equality of treatment and opportunity for all persons in the armed forces without regard to race, color, religion, or national origin." The order also established an advisory committee to examine the rules, practices, and procedures of the armed services and recommend ways to make desegregation a reality. There was considerable resistance to the executive order from the military, but by the end of the Korean conflict, almost all the military was integrated.
