

The Reverend Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. first rose to national attention leading the boycott of public transportation in Montgomery, Alabama after the arrest of Rosa Parks for refusing to give up her seat on a bus to a white man. As the boycott proved, Dr. King believed the best way to fight discrimination was through something he called Civil Disobedience...or peaceful protest. Dr. King led dozens of peaceful protests against segregation and racial discrimination—even becoming the youngest winner of the Nobel Peace Prize in 1964 for his work—until his death in April of 1968 at the hands of a white escaped convict named James Earl Ray. Immediately, in over 100 cities across America rioting broke out. Stores were looted and burned and dozens of people were injured or killed.
